## FRENCH GREETINGS

French Phrase	Pronunciation Guide	English Translation	Context / Usage Note
<b>Bonjour</b>	<i>bohn-zhoor</i>	Hello / Good Day	The go-to greeting during the day.
<b>Salut</b>	<i>sah-loo</i>	Hi / Bye	Casual; use with friends or family only.
<b>Bonsoir</b>	<i>bohn-swahr</i>	Good evening	Used as a greeting after 6:00 PM.
<b>Ça va ?</b>	<i>sah vah</i>	How's it going?	Informal; very common in daily life.
<b>Comment allez-vous ?</b>	<i>ko-mahn tah-lay voo</i>	How are you?	Formal or for addressing a group.
<b>Enchanté(e)</b>	<i>ahn-shahn-tay</i>	Nice to meet you	Use the "e" at the end if you are female.
<b>Au revoir</b>	<i>oh rve-wahr</i>	Goodbye	The standard, neutral way to leave.
<b>À bientôt</b>	<i>ah bee-yehn-toh</i>	See you soon	When you'll see them again somewhat soon.
<b>À tout à l'heure</b>	<i>ah too tah luhr</i>	See you in a bit	Use if seeing them again later today.
<b>À demain</b>	<i>ah duh-man</i>	See you tomorrow	Specifically for the next day.
<b>Bonne journée</b>	<i>bun zhoor-nay</i>	Have a good day	A polite "goodbye" during the day.
<b>Bonne soirée</b>	<i>bun swah-ray</i>	Have a good evening	A polite "goodbye" after dark.
<b>Bonne nuit</b>	<i>bun nwee</i>	Good night	Only used right before going to sleep.
